



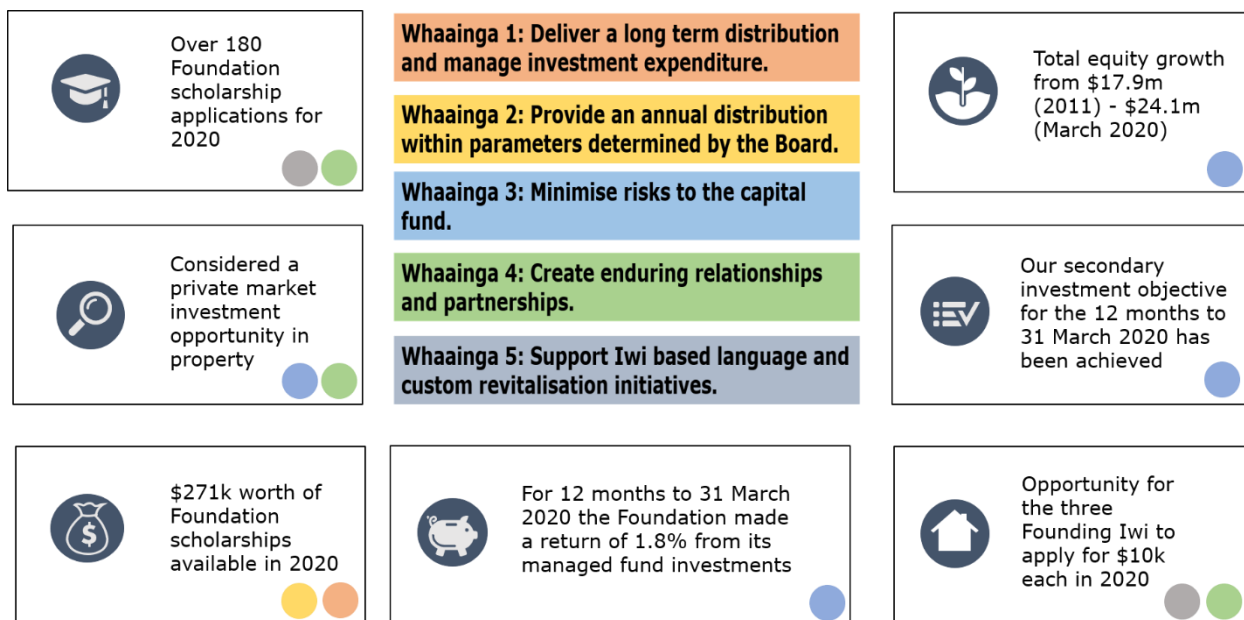

INTRODUCTION

KEY DEVELOPMENTS

This quarter has seen the following key developments:

Ngā Tauria I Whiwahi Kārahipi

We are pleased to provide the names and whakapapa of those students who received Foundation Scholarships in 2019. See **Appendix One** for a list of names. See below for a summary.

Carryover of TWR Underspend

Te Wānanga o Raukawa (**TWR**) advised in January 2020 that there was a balance of \$43,374.09 remaining from the 2019 distribution to TWR (**Balance**). This was mainly due to non-completion of students who had initially received a scholarship. The Foundation Board has approved that the Balance be carried over and utilised by TWR in 2020 as further funding for Foundation Scholarships.

Parameters for 2020 Distribution to TWR

As noted in the previous Quarterly Report \$227,760 was approved for TWR in 2020. The Foundation sent correspondence to TWR setting out the parameters in which the 2020 distribution to TWR must be used. Those parameters were:

- a. to fund scholarships to TWR students enrolled in 2020 – with a priority focus on applications from students who are from Ngāti Raukawa, Ngāti Toa or Te Atiawa (the **Founding Iwi**);
- b. to fund scholarships to all students enrolled in the Heke Reo Kaumatua (**HRK**) in 2020. This includes the new intake for 2020 as well as the second year of the first intake of the HRK students.

There was one addition on the parameters set in 2019 and that was that the funding be utilised to fully fund HRK students. The Foundation is proud to be able to financially support all kaumātua wanting to progress their Te Reo Māori journey. It is also very apt that things have come full circle and some of those kaiāwhina who were involved in the progression of Whakatapuranga Rua Mano in the 70s/80s, but not fortunate enough to have had the reo at that time, are now able to start their journey through the HRK programme.

Update on Foundation Scholarships 2020

There has been high interest in the 2020 Foundations scholarships. There has been over 180 applications submitted with 1/3rd of those applications coming from students from Founding Iwi. Over the three years the scholarships have operated there has been steady growth and interest in them. 2018 saw 61 approved scholarships with 17 (or 28%) of those going to students from Founding Iwi. 2019 saw 78 approved scholarships with 41 (or 58%) of those going to students from Founding Iwi. This year we have seen similar interest and expect similar growth.

Founding Iwi – Invitation to submit Proposal

In April 2020 communications were sent to Te Rūnanga o Raukawa, Te Rūnanga o Toa Rangatira and Whakarongotai Marae Trustees advising that \$10,000 has been made available to each of the roopu for 2020 and inviting project proposals. Projects must promote the Charitable Purposes of the Foundation.

Outstanding Projects and Reporting

The Whakarongotai Marae Trustees and Te Rūnanga o Raukawa will need to fully complete their 2018 project and provide an acceptable project accountability report before they can access the 2020 distribution. Unfortunately as these roopu have not completed their 2018 project accountability requirements they were unable to access the 2019 distribution of \$10,000.

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Policy Developments

We continue to update and add to our organisational policies. This quarter we have:

- Developed and approved a **Founding Iwi Distribution Policy**. The purpose of this policy is to provide clarity around purpose and process of the annual grants the Foundation makes available to Founding Iwi.
- Developed and approved a **Private Markets Investment Policy**.
- Reviewed and updated the **Te Haaro o te Kahu Subcommittee Terms of Reference**.
- Reviewed and updated the **Te Puna Wai o Rangiaatea Subcommittee Terms of Reference**.
- Developed and approved a **Board Remuneration Policy**.
- Developed and approved an **E-Signature Policy**.

Private Markets Investment Policy

It was a requirement of the Foundation’s Statement of Investment Policy and Objectives (**SIPO**) that this policy be developed. The Foundation would like to warmly thank the Raukawa ki Te Tonga Asset Holding Company for sharing their policy with us and allowing us to use it as a template to build upon.

The Policy sets out a comprehensive framework for the Foundation to assess direct investment opportunities against. Under the Policy the Foundation can invest up to 15% of the value of the Foundation Fund in direct investment opportunities. Direct investment opportunities envisaged by the Policy include taonga assets (assets that have cultural/historical significance to the Foundation or its stakeholders); property; and investments that contribute to employment or work experience, for the benefit of TWoR, its staff and/or students.

Private Market Investment Opportunity

The Foundation considered a private market investment opportunity this quarter – an investment in a property investment fund with other Māori organisations. After undertaking an initial assessment of the opportunity the Foundation Board decided that although a

promising opportunity it was not the best time for the Foundation to extend beyond its current investments at this time.

Foundation Subcommittee Appointments

Te Haaro o Te Kahu is a subcommittee of the Foundation that looks after the strategy and planning. The Board has re-appointed Jeanette Grace, Ani Parata, Ann-Maree Ellison, Robin Hapi and John Barrett onto the subcommittee for a further 3 year terms and has re-appointed Jeanette as the chairperson of the subcommittee.

Te Puna Wai o Rangiātea is the investment, audit and risk subcommittee of the Foundation. The Board has re-appointed Matiu Rei, Mereana Selby and Robin Hapi onto the subcommittee and reappointed Robin as the subcommittee chairperson.

Te Pūia Tāpapa Transaction

Te Pūia Tāpapa is a Māori direct investment fund. There are 26 limited partners of the fund who have collectively contributed \$115.5m. The key purpose of this fund is to progress long-term direct co-investments opportunities in NZ. The expected return for the Fund is 12%. The Foundation currently has \$1m on-call with Te Pūia Tāpapa (which equates to a .87% shareholding).

Te Pūia Tāpapa issued its first feasible capital call in February 2020. Of the total value of the fund \$115.5m - \$10.2 million was sought from limited partners. This equated to \$88k for the Foundation. The investment is a co-investment with the NZ Superfund. Further details on the investment will be made available when released by Te Pūia Tāpapa. Note that this transaction is on hold until after Covid-19 lockdown when a regulatory approval can be progressed.

Investment Training

The Board had approved investment governance training which was planned for end of April 2020. This particular training was to focus on standard investment governance such as components of effective investment policies, monitoring investment fees and costs and responsible investment governance. On top of this though the training had a key focus on changes to investment provisions in the new Trusts Act 2019 which included addressing the fiduciary duty to diversify and what the new investment provisions mean in practice.

The Foundation had extended the invitation of TWoR Te Mana Whakahaere and key staff and there was good interest. Unfortunately, we had to postpone this training until later in 2020 due to the inability to meet ā-kanohi.

This will be something the Foundation will pick up again post-Covid when we are able to do this mahi ā-kanohi.

Quarterly Investment Report as at 31 March 2020

The Foundation SIPO requires that quarterly investment reports be prepared that analyse investment performance of the Foundation's assets (the **Fund**) and the performance of the managers appointed to manage the Fund on the Foundation's behalf. Outlined below are some key highlights from the quarterly investment report:

The Fund's Return

The following table sets out the return of the Fund and the Foundation's Fund Managers over the last year, 6 months and 3 months. The red number for the Milford Conservative Fund is for information – it is not relevant to the Fund's performance as the allocation to the Conservative fund was only made in October 2019.

For the 12 months to 31 March 2020 the Foundation made a return of 1.8% from its managed fund investments.

This is a stark contrast to the numbers only three months ago where the return for 12 months to 31 December 2019 was 16.38% (refer to table below).

All markets had almost unbelievable falls and volatility in March 2020 as the Covid-19 responses kicked in. Hence the 12 month numbers to 31 March 2020 cover extreme volatility in March due to the impact of Covid-19 and the global government's responses to the threat.

SIPO Objectives

The Foundation has met one of its two investment objectives, as expressed in the SIPO, over the 12 months to 31 March 2020:

- The **primary investment objective** is to see a return of CPI inflation rate (2.9% currently) + 3.5% which = 6.1%. The year to 31 March 2020 has seen a total return on the Foundation's investments of 1.81%. This is well below 6.1%. The primary investment objective has not been met for the 12 months to 31 March 2020 however

the objective is over rolling 5 year periods. We will need time to determine whether the target will again be met and whether it will remain appropriate.

- The **secondary investment objective** is to manage the risk of the total portfolio so that negative returns are expected to occur no more frequently than one year in five on average and that any such losses might be recouped in following years. This has been met – just, considering the fact that the Fund did earn a negative return in the 4th quarter 2018 of -7.1% and that it had fully recovered and more in the next 12 months. But then we have had the Covid-19 impact in the most recent quarter and the Fund again had a poor quarter of -6.8%. Whether this will be recovered in the next 12 months is almost impossible to assess.

The Fund Managers
